GET THE FACTS:

Architectural and Civil Drafters prepare detailed drawings of architectural and structural features of buildings or drawings and topographical relief maps used in civil engineering projects, such as highways, bridges, and public works. Use knowledge of building materials, engineering practices, and mathematics to complete drawings.

Architects plan and design structures, such as private residences, office buildings, theaters, factories, and other structural property. Architecture students learn the fundamentals of architecture design, technology, history and theory.

WORKFORCE TRENDS:

Employment of Architects and Architectural Drafters is projected to **GROW 7 percent** from 2014 to 2024, about as fast as the average for all occupations.

Those with up-to- date technical skills —including a strong grasp of CAD and BIM— and experience in sustainable design will have an advantage.

Cabinetmakers cut, shape, and assemble wooden articles or set up and operate a variety of woodworking machines, such as power saws and jointers to surface, cut, or shape lumber or to fabricate parts for wood products.

Furniture Finishers shape, finish, and refinish damaged, worn, or used furniture or new high-grade furniture to specified color or finish.

WORKFORCE TRENDS:

Employment of Cabinetmakers and Furniture Finishers is projected to **GROW** 4% from 2014 to 2024.

Those who have advanced skills, including the ability to use computer-controlled machinery and good math skills should have the best job opportunities.

PATHWAY: CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT/CARPENTRY

GET THE FACTS:

Construction Managers plan, direct, or coordinate activities concerned with the construction and maintenance of structures, facilities, and systems. Participate in the conceptual development of a construction project and oversee its organization, scheduling, budgeting, and implementation.

Building Inspectors inspect structures using engineering skills to determine structural soundness and compliance with specifications, building codes, and other regulations. Inspections may be limited to a specific area, such as electrical systems or plumbing.

Carpenters construct, erect, install, or repair structures and fixtures made of wood, such as concrete forms, building frameworks, window and door frames, and hardwood floors.

WORKFORCE TRENDS:

Employment of Construction Managers, Building Inspectors and Carpenters is projected to GROW 5-8 percent from 2014 to 2024, about as fast as the average for all occupations.

Those with a bachelor's (BS) degree coupled with construction experience will have the best job prospects.

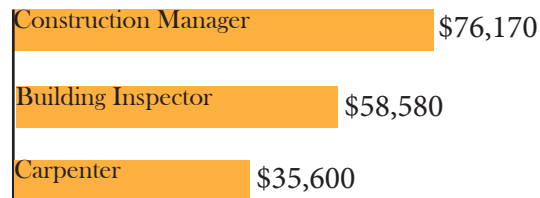
